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Phil 215: Kant, Cognition and the Destruction of Metaphysics

Kant is famous for having argued that we cannot have cognition of things in themselves, including the objects of traditional metaphysics, such as God, freedom, and the soul. In this seminar we will investigate Kant's criticisms of metaphysics by first considering his account of cognition (in the Transcendental Aesthetic and Analytic), and then reconstructing some of his specific criticisms of particular metaphysical claims (in the Transcendental Dialectic). We will also consider what attitude one ought to have (rather than cognition) toward the objects of metaphysics (in the Appendix to the Transcendental Dialectic and the Canon of Pure Reason).

Requirements

<u>I. Short writing assignments</u>. Chosose either Option A or Option B. Option A.

1. Two short papers (4 pages): Before Monday of Week 5, write a first short paper devoted to reconstructing Kant's analysis of the argument of the First or Second Paralogism, noting the main alternative interpretations of that analysis. It should not take secondary literature into account. Before Monday of Week 8, write a second short paper devoted to reconstructing Kant's analysis of either the Second Antinomy or the Ontological Argument.

Option B.

- 1. One short paper (4 pages): Before Monday of Week 5, write a short paper devoted to reconstructing Kant's analysis of the argument of the First or Second Paralogism, noting the main alternative interpretations of that analysis. It should not take secondary literature into account.
- 2. One book review (1000 words): Choose one book from the list below, and write a 1000-word book review. Devote two thirds of the review to stating what the book's main thesis and argument is and one third to a respectful but critical interpretive take on it. It is due by Monday of Week 8.

Both the short papers and the book review will be distributed to the class.

- II. One term paper (15 –18 pages): Approval of term paper topics is required before the end of Week 8. The term paper is due on Thursday of finals week (March 20).
- III. Class participation: Active participation in every class is required of all students.
