The aim of this course is to bring philosophy to bear on three central questions concerning race: What is race? What is racism? and What is racial identity? We will be pursuing these questions *philosophically*. What *that* comes to — how philosophy can contribute to answering these questions — is an additional issue that we will address. The course presupposes no previous work in race, the philosophy of race or philosophy and can serve as an introduction to these topics. The course will ask you to think rigorously about fundamental questions about race and to

question your fundamental assumptions about the topic. It will ask you to reflect carefully about an emotionally charged subject.

Papers

Extensions will be granted when circumstances warrant *provided arrangements are made with the instructor at least 24 hours in advance*. There are no automatic extensions. Except in unusual circumstances (e.g. medical emergencies, a disaster that strikes the student or the immediate family), unexcused late papers are subject to the penalty of being dropped at least one letter grade e.g. B>C.
