## **Course Description**

This seminar is intended as a survey of ancient views about wisdom as the end of philosophical inquiry, with special reference to the relation of theoretical and practical wisdom, and conceptions of theoretical wisdom as centered on the goal of becoming god-like or one with god. Our primary goal is to investigate how and why wisdom serves as a reference point across a broad range of different philosophies in antiquity and, more briefly, how this was challenged by later developments in philosophy. A secondary goal is to raise the issue of whether wisdom has a role to play in guiding philosophy today—a topic of which there has been surprisingly little discussion.

No prior background in ancient philosophy is supposed. Enrolled students will be required to write a take-home midterm exam, and a longer final paper in which one may explore the topic from a perspective of one's choosing (historical or contemporary).
