Course description:

This class is an introduction to philosophical approaches to contemporary questions in applied ethics. In the first portion of the class we will be examining three theoretical approaches to ethical questions: Mill's utilitarianism, Kant's deontology, and Ross' pluralistic deontology. With this theoretical background in place, we will then move to examining questions that arise in applied ethics. The first two questions we will look at pertain to reproductive ethics. We will look at whether it is permissible to have children, and whether parents ought to be licensed. Next we will look at whether drugs should be legal, and whether there is a general obligation to follow the law. The last section will look at what we owe to others, and whether we have an obligation to treat everyone impartially when it comes to charitable giving.
